NOAA is hosting an Alla Prima Palette Knife Workshop in January 2020. Beverly Boulet will be our workshop instructor. She is one of our past presidents, and is an active

French Quarter artist. The workshop is geared for any experience level. The two day class will include instruction in the use of painting knives, various techniques used to acquire different painterly effects, and methods of mixing and applying the paint to ensure vibrant color. The goal is to loosen up, have fun, and complete artworks that have rich color and texture. Alkyds, oils and acrylics are suitable for these techniques.

Painting Design:

- ❖ Remember we are the director of our own movie and our painting surface is our stage. Our main star will be placed at the focal point, then our co-star in the secondary point and the supporting cast in our tertiary point. Aim to create a triangular shape where these three points connect. If we stick to this approach we will achieve success more often than not.
- ❖ When thinking about my design, I like to follow the principles of the "Golden Mean Theory."
- ❖ This theory relates to proportion and harmony. I start by dividing my surface into one third or two thirds especially when I know where I will be placing my primary focal point. The focal point must be the first and last area that the viewer stops at. I believe by using lead-in lines to and from our primary focal point that we will be on our way to achieving a striking composition. I'm also careful to make sure that these lines are at different strengths for this will also enhance our overall visual story.

Value:

- ❖ We must understand our warm to cool values. This will give us depth in our paintings.
- ❖ I like to approach my paintings as I would a pencil drawing, thinking in terms of dark to light initially. Then I will actively search for the most interesting dark shapes, this evolves into my overall tonal plan.
- ❖ I place high importance on my tonal values, because if this is correct I can easily adjust my shapes and edges to complete a successful painting.
